AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members of University Of Toronto Faculty Association

We have audited the statement of financial position of University of Toronto Faculty Association as at June 30, 2008 and the statements of revenue and expenses, changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

The organization derives revenue from membership fees, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of membership fees was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues, excess of revenues over expenses (expenses over revenue), current assets and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the revenues referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as at June 30, 2008 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

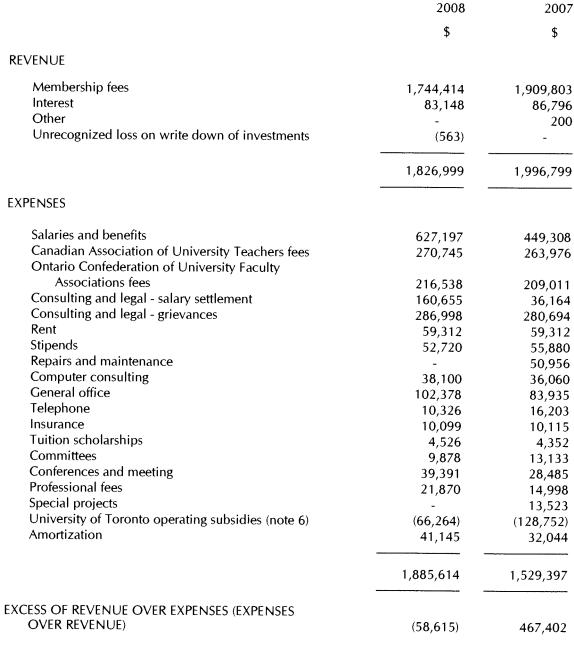

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 2008



1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The purpose of the University Of Toronto Faculty Association is to promote the welfare of current and retired faculty, librarians and research associates of the University of Toronto, the University of St. Michael's College, the University of Trinity College, and Victoria University, and generally to advance the interests of teachers, researchers and librarians in Canadian universities.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Revenue Recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for revenue. Membership fee revenue is comprised of unrestricted contributions that are recognized as revenue when received or when receivable, if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and if collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Membership fees are calculated by multiplying a mill rate, as set by the organization, by the member's salary.

b) Contributed Services

Volunteers contribute numerous hours each year to assist the organization in carrying out its service delivery activities. As the fair value of the contributed services cannot be reasonably estimated, they are not recognized in the financial statements.

c) Short-Term Investments

Short-term investments are recorded at either the amortized cost or the original acquisition cost. Investments whose carrying value exceeds market value are expected to be held until maturity or until market value exceeds carrying value. If there is an other than temporary decline in value, these investments are written down to provide for the loss.

d) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided annually at rates calculated to write off the property and equipment over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Furniture and equipment Computer equipment Leasehold improvements Straight-line over 5 years Straight-line over 3 years Straight-line over 5 years

Property and equipment acquired during the year are amortized at one-half of the indicated rates.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

e) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Property and equipment and other long-lived assets are reviewed for impairment as whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of an asset may not be recoverable. Impairment is assessed by comparing the carrying amount of an asset with its expected future net undiscounted cash flows from use together with its residual value (net recoverable value). If such assets are considered impaired, the impairment to be recognized is measured by the amount by which the carrying amount of the assets exceed its fair value. Any impairment results in a write-down of the asset and a charge to income during the year.

f) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financials statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relates to accruals and estimated useful lives of property and equipment. These estimates are reviewed periodically and as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known.

g) Income Taxes

The organization is a not-for-profit organization within the meaning of the Income Tax Act and as such is exempt from income taxes.

h) Recent Accounting Pronouncements

(i) Accounting Changes

Effective July 1, 2007, the organization adopted the new recommendations of the CICA Handbook Section 1506, Accounting Changes. Under these new recommendations, voluntary changes in accounting policy are permitted only when they result in the financial statements providing reliable and/or relevant information.

These recommendations also require changes in accounting policy to be applied retrospectively unless doing so is impracticable, require prior period errors to be corrected retrospectively, require enhanced disclosures about the effect of changes in accounting policies, estimates and errors on the financial statements and require disclosure of new primary sources of GAAP that have been issued but not yet effective. The adoption of Section 1506 has no impact on these financial statements.

h) Recent Accounting Pronouncements (cont'd)

ii) Capital Disclosures

CICA Handbook Section 1535, Capital Disclosures, requires disclosure of an entity's objectives, policies and processes for managing capital, quantitative data about what the entity regards as capital and whether the entity has complied with any capital requirements and, if it has not complied, the consequences of such noncompliance.

This standard is effective for interim and annual financial statements relating to fiscal years beginning on or after October 1, 2007, specifically July 1, 2008 for this organization. The organization has not yet determined the impact of the adoption of this Section on the disclosures in its financial statements.

iii) General Standards on Financial Statement Presentation

CICA Handbook Section 1400, General Standards on Financial Statement Presentation, has been amended to include requirements to assess and disclose an entity's ability to continue as a going concern. This standard is effective for interim and annual financial statements relating to fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2008, specifically July 1, 2008 for this organization. The organization does not expect the adoption of this standard to have an impact on its financial statements.

iv) Financial Instruments

In October 2007, the AcSB approved disclosure and presentation requirements for financial instruments that revise and enhance the disclosure requirement of Section 3861. These requirements are included in Section 3862. Financial Instruments – Disclosure (Section 3862) and financial Instruments – Presentation (Section 3863), which replaces Section 3861.

Section 3862 requires disclosures, by class of financial instruments, which enable users to evaluate the significance of financial instruments for an entity financial position and performance, including disclosures about fair value. In addition, disclosure is required of qualitative and quantitative information about exposures to risks arising from financing instruments, including specific minimum disclosures about credit risk, liquidity risk and each type of market risk to which an entity is exposed, showing how net income (loss) would have been affected by reasonable possible changes in the relevant risk variable. This standard is effective for not for – profit organizations for year ends beginning on or after October 1, 2008, specifically July 1, 2009 for the organization. The organization has not yet determined the impact of the adoption of this change on the disclosure in its financial statements.

- h) Recent Accounting Pronouncements (cont'd)
 - v) Financial Statement Presentation for Not-For-Profit Organizations

For year ends beginning on or after January 1, 2009, not-for-profit organizations must apply the updated standards of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants contained in Sections 4400 and 4470 of the CICA Handbook. The amendments includes the following requirements:

- that each component of revenue, expenses, gain and loss that is required by primary sources of GAAP (Section 1000) be separately identified in the statements of financial position and changes in net assets
- the disclosure of restrictions whether under the deferral or restricted fund method
- the presentation of revenues and expenses at gross amounts where the organization acts as a principal in transactions
- presentation of a statement of cash flows in accordance with Section 1540, Cash Flow Statements
- that when allocations of fundraising and general support expenses have been made to other functions, the inclusion in the accounting policy notes an explanation of the policies adopted for the allocation of expenses among functions, the nature of the expenses being allocated and the basis on which such allocations have been made. In addition, the amounts allocated from each of these two functions, and the amounts and the functions to which they have been allocated, should be disclosed.

The organization has not yet determined the impact of the adoption of these changes on its financial statements.

(vi) Inventories

CICA Handbook Section 3031, Inventories, replaces Section 3030 and establishes new standards for the measurement and disclosure of inventories. The main features of the new Section are as follows:

- Measurement of inventories at the lower of cost and net realizable value
- Consistent use of either first-in, first-out or a weighted average cost formula to measure cost
- Reversal of previous write-downs to net realizable value when there is a subsequent increase to the value of inventories.

This standard is effective for interim and annual non-consolidated financial statements relating to fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2008 specifically July 1, 2008 for this organization. This standard is not expected to have an effect on this Organization.

- h) Recent Accounting Pronouncements (cont'd)
 - vii) Goodwill and Intangible Assets

In January 2008, the CICA issued Section 3064 "Goodwill and Intangible Assets", which replaces Section 3062 "Goodwill and Other Intangible Assets", and results in the withdrawal of Section 3450 "Research and Development Costs", and Emerging Issues Committee Abstract 27 "Revenues and Expenditures during the Pre-operating Period", and amendments to Accounting Guideline No 11 "Enterprises in the Development Stage". The standard provides guidance on the recognition of intangible assets in accordance with the definition of an asset and the criteria for asset recognition as well as clarifying the application of the concept of matching revenues and expenses, whether these assets are separately acquired or internally developed. This standard applies to interim and annual financial statements relating to fiscal years beginning on or after October 1, 2008, which for this Organization is July 1, 2009. Earlier adoption is encouraged. This standard is not expected to have an effect on this Organization.

viii) Future Reporting Standards

At the September 23-24 meeting, the Accounting Standards Board (AcSB) decided that private enterprises would not be required to adopt the following sections:

- Section 1530, Comprehensive Income
- Section 1651, Foreign Currency Translation
- Section 3051, Investments
- Section 3251, Equity
- Section 3855, Financial Instruments Recognition and Measurement
- Section 3862, Financial Instruments Disclosures
- Section 3863, Financial Instruments Presentation
- Section 3865, Hedges

Although, currently, these exemptions do not apply to not-for-profit organizations, the AcSB is undergoing further consultations on the future of reporting for not-for-profit organizations and may allow these organizations to apply the standards for private enterprises. The outcome of these developments cannot be determined at this time.

5. INTERNALLY RESTRICTED FUND

The organization's Council has internally restricted \$750,000 of unrestricted net assets to be held as a reserve for salary, benefits and pension negotiations, major grievances, academic freedom and other contingencies. This internally restricted amount is not available for other purposes without the approval of the Council.

6. UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO OPERATING SUBSIDIES

Under an agreement, the University of Toronto provides the organization with various services, the most significant of which are free rent and a telephone line subsidy. The market value of this rent and the telephone line subsidy is shown as an expense recovery.
